Frederick County is Maryland's largest county in size—663 square miles. The City of Frederick, the county seat, is intersected by five interstate and national highways that provide easy access to Baltimore (46 miles), Washington, D.C. (44 miles), Gettysburg, Pa. (32 miles), Harpers Ferry, W.Va. (21 miles), and Leesburg, Va. (25 miles). It is home to the 5,700-acre Catoctin Mountain Park, site of the Camp David Presidential Retreat. Frederick County is also Maryland's largest dairy producer, and has the second largest

Institute and SAIC-Frederick broke ground on an advanced technology research facility which will provide 330,000 sf for offices and state-of-the-art labs for cancer and AIDS research, and will be the cornerstone for a research campus at the site. In addition, expansion at Fort Detrick includes \$373 million in ongoing construction and \$2 billion in total projects over the next two years creating over 1,100 additional jobs through 2018.
